## ANNUAL REPORT, 2013

## **General Report**

Christa visited Nicaragua and Honduras in early January and December of 2013, and accepted a total of 7 more girls from Nicaragua over the year. The older girls already with the program were warned that they would not continue to receive the scholarship if they failed any of their classes, as two of them had, and one of those had to repeat her first year of secondary school. In December, Yosmari and Yulisa were dropped from the program, since they failed several classes and didn't comply with requests to provide letters and grade cards to our contact.

Christa was able to visit Camila's school in Tegucigalpa and was impressed with the grounds, the teachers and the lesson plans. Living Water Academy is a bilingual school and Camila is thriving, now in second grade. Klaudina graduated from her English classes at IHCI in December, and ONE agreed to pay for her regular schooling following that, as it is a huge burden on Klaudina's mother to pay for all her tuition and supplies. In December, the board also voted to pay for Klaudina to continue at IHCI with adult conversation classes.

ONE also accepted Angela from Mexico, and Guddi from India. Guddi is an older student (30s), who left school at age 13 and wants to finish her schooling with the help of Aarti from Sakhi For Girls Education. At the end of the year, Guddi was admitted to  $10^{\rm th}$  Standard in school, and is doing well.

In Nepal, Swostika had to leave the program because the state forced her to move to an orphanage, which has its own school. Roshani Tamang took her place, and her little sister Bunu, is hoping for a scholarship next year.

At the end of 2013, ONE has 22 scholarship applicants, up from 16 the year before. These recipients represent nine countries: Mexico, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru, Haiti, Tanzania, Uganda, Nepal and India. All the girls are passing their classes and doing

well, and we received several letters from them and even a recording of Klaudina speaking to the board in English.

We now have Benefactors for the following students: Wini, Mireya, Alondra, Sua, Fatima, Karina, Glenda, and half of Camila's fees every year. Efforts continue to find Benefactors for the other girls. The Flagstaff Arts and Leadership Academy's National Honors Society students want to raise money to pay for Naume in Uganda, though whether this will be a one-time thing or annual is uncertain.

In August, Cory Sheely resigned from the board due to schedule constraints, leaving the board with two members. Flagstaff locals Ryan Heinsius and his wife Cole are interested in serving on the board.

Fundraising efforts were again focused on the website, word of mouth, electronic mailings and the annual fundraiser, the Family Dance Party, which brought in nearly \$1,000 in October. The Facebook page is has 72 likes, and contains albums of all the scholarship recipients, which are updated regularly.

In October, we did some work on the website, changing images and adding easier ways to subscribe to the mailing list. We also changed the donation page to add different donation "levels," that someone could choose, including a description of what that donation could pay for.

The year-end appeal brought in \$4,850 in additional donations. In 2013 the foundation received approximately \$500 more than the previous year.
